Sermon October 6, 2024

John 21:15-19

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.'

And mass shootings in America have become so normalized that we don't hear about most of the incidents. The cries for peace call out in multiple languages.

As the election rapidly approaches, I am reminded again how separated we have become from one another. We live in a time when 50% of our country fundamentally disagree about who we are, where we are going. People are divided and angry, looking at the things that separate us and make us different. It's becoming harder and harder to hear one another, to enter into one another's stories.

But today, we remember what connects us

Soon we will gather around the table

Once we have eaten our fill... nourished body and soul, Jesus reminds us that there is more that we need to do.

"Feed my Sheep" "Follow me"

After we are finished here, you are invited to join the Crossroads team as we continue to envision and discern who we are and why God has called us to this place. Each person will have an opportunity to share what they dream of for this congregation, our community and our world. And we will gather to discover this together over a lovely meal.

Food connects us. Jesus did much of his ministry over a shared meal. In these days, the things that connect us are vital. So let us follow the one who calls us. Let us feed ad care for the world-wide flock. Let us remember who we are.
